They will also enjoy access to the RCM's renowned Creative Careers Centre, which provides an unparalleled professional development service. Playing a full and active part in the musical life of the RCM, the quartet will also be ambassadors for the College in the wider musical world.

The RCM String Quartet Fellowship will enable the successful quartet to gain experience, confidence and connections of the kind which will help to establish a professional profile, as well as developing musical understanding and artistic individuality. A flourishing string quartet will be offered the space and time to delve into the extensive repertoire and to examine the ever-changing dynamic of playing and performing in a small chamber ensemble.

They will greatly benefit from the Royal College of Music's world-renowned coaching, mentoring and performance opportunities.
